The work of our law enforcement officers has always been the subject of great public interest. But in recent decades, this noble profession has been increasingly criticized and unfairly maligned. Public officials, activists, and the media frequently distort the facts around police use of force, especially deadly force. The narrative that excessive force is commonplace, discrimination is rampant, and law enforcement officers are out of control is not only false, but it also promotes dangerous hostility toward police.

Sadly, some exploit these misperceptions for political gain. More and more elected prosecutors are targeting completely innocent law enforcement officers to satisfy ideological aims or advance their careers – at the expense of the truth and justice. Fortunately, officers in the vast majority of these cases are vindicated at trial – but not before bearing the crippling financial burden of defending themselves in court.

To ease this burden and ensure justice for these officers, the Law Enforcement Legal Defense Fund (LELDF) was born. Over the past 30 years, the LELDF has provided legal defense funding to more than 90 law enforcement officers. Since 2020, the number of officers requesting our support has skyrocketed every year.

LELDF CASE INTAKE PROCESS

1	Application submitted via secure portal
2	Introductory call with the LELDF representative
3	Applicant or their legal representative provides requested documents for the LELDF review
4	The LELDF reviews case to ensure compliance with case support standards
5	The LELDF president briefs the LELDF board of directors on the request including details of available evidence
6	The LELDF Board of Directors votes on whether to extend the LELDF financial supports

Although the LELDF board of directors occasionally grants exceptions, it prioritizes the cases of law enforcement officers charged with a felony. The LELDF does not provide defense support funding for cases involving non-duty related actions or in situations in which, in the LELDF's sole judgment, criminal charges are legally appropriate.

RESEARCH AND ADVOCACY

DEFUNDING THE POLICE

Launched in 2021, the LELDF's "Defending the Police" project builds on our decades-long commitment to promoting effective, constitutional policing through data-driven research and staunch advocacy for those who 'protect and serve' our communities. The LELDF serves as an independent voice for the men and woman of law enforcement and for policies that support the noble profession of law enforcement and ensure public safety and due process. Our rigorous research and public advocacy efforts apply a fact-based approach through original research reports, op-eds and commentary, public speeches and testimony, factsheets, and stakeholder and media engagement.

ORIGINAL RESEARCH REPORTS

Prosecutorial Malpractice: Progressive Prosecutors, Public Safety, and Felony Outcomes (2020)

Examining the effectiveness of progressive prosecutors compared to their immediate less radical predecessors in six major cities, finding a significant decline in prosecutions and convictions even as crime rose.

Less Policing = More Murders (2021)

Demonstrating that as proactive policing (arrests, stops, searches) declined in the wake of the 2020 Floyd unrest, homicides rose dramatically in 10 major cities. De-policing cost lives.

Justice for Sale: How George Soros Put Radical Prosecutors in Power (2022)

Tracing, in a first of its kind study, how billionaire George Soros spent over \$40 million to elect 75 progressive district attorneys and millions more to build an advocacy network to promote radical policies impacting one in five Americans and most major cities.

Reform by Decree: How DOJ Enacts Its Policing Agenda (2023)

Outlines the nature and scope of the federally imposed police reform settlements or "consent decrees" and their harmful unintended consequences including their budgetary burden, drawn out timelines, and negative impact on public safety and police morale.

Fatal Falsehoods: Setting the Record Straight on Police Shootings (2024)

Analyzing the publicly available data on police use of force and shootings, showing that, contrary to media claims, such incidents are rare, limited and largely justified. The study is the first to uncover widespread errors and misrepresentations in the Pulitzer-prize winning Washington Post police shootings database.

TURNING IN THE BADGE: POLICE ATTRITION AFTER 'DEFUND THE POLICE' (2021)

Analyzing the law enforcement attrition in 15 large departments, as demoralized police quit and retired in droves and recruitment fell due to anti-police policies and rhetoric.



FOLLOW THE MONEY: MAPPING SOROS PROSECUTOR FUNDING (2024)

Documenting the identities and locations of 27 Sorosfunded prosecutors, the front groups used to bankroll their campaigns, and the total amount each district attorney received, in an interactive mapping tool.





STEPPING INTO THE SHOES OF LAW ENFORCEMENT

IN-PERSON MOBILE POLICE SIMULATOR

For over a decade, the LELDF has offered stakeholders, the media, and the general public the opportunity to "step into the shoes" of law enforcement during use of force scenarios with its mobile police simulator. The simulator program has given numerous members of the media the firsthand opportunity to see what split-second decisions look like and judge for themselves.





"On a screen projected onto the wall in front of me, I watch a madman go on a workplace shooting rampage. Bodies line the floor. I'm the only officer on the scene. If I don't act fast, more will die. Everything is moving so quickly that it's almost impossible to tell between shooters and victims. I eventually take down the intruder, but obviously not soon enough."



"DECISION POINTS" INTERACTIVE, ONLINE, AND ACCESSIBLE

To complement our simulator program, the LELDF launched a new, first of its kind online experience tool, "Decision Points," in November 2021. It allows users to experience firsthand real-life high-stakes situations faced by law enforcement officers. Using actual police bodycam footage, the tool walks the user through the scenario in real-time, pausing to ask the user what decision they would or should make at a critical juncture. The tool then provides the user with an explanation why their choice was appropriate or not and continues the scenario, stopping repeatedly to engage the user on their preferred decision. It then provides analysis from a law enforcement "use of force" expert on how the scenario unfolded and why decisions were made.

The tool offers the media, government officials, stakeholders, and the general public the ability to "walk in the shoes" of law enforcement and better understand how split-second, life and death decisions are made by police every day. To date, over 33,000 users have accessed the Decision Points simulator. The simulator has been featured on Fox News, Police1, LawOfficer.com, The Epoch Times, and numerous radio shows and podcasts.







REACHING THE PUBLIC: EDUCATING THROUGH SOCIAL MEDIA






